one of the fifty original members of the National Academy of Sciences, incorporated by act of Congress in 1863; helped found what became the Sheffield Scientific School at Yale - which granted the first Doctor of Philosophy degree in the US (1863); well-known as a teacher and author of textbooks; investigated mineralogy, petroleum, coal, precious metals, and the combustion of gases for illumination; wrote a report in 1855 that launched the world's petroleum industry by reporting his methods and results of a chemical analysis of rock oil from Pennsylvania, and recommending uses of the several hydrocarbons obtained from petroleum (kerosene, gasoline, and paraffin).
