one of the founders of the American Chemical Society; expert in sugar refining, petroleum refining, the manufacture of illuminating gas, photomechanical processes, and calico printing; invented a system of assay weights (whereby the amount of metal in a ton of ore is easily and quickly computed in grams or ounces), a universal flash-point apparatus, the Chandler photometer, the Chandler-Baumé hydrometer scale, a sludge metering device, a flow-meter chemical-solution feeder for water softening, and the flush closet for toilets; father of modern sanitation.

FOOTNOTE: Chandler studied one year with Wöhler in Göttingen and was Rose's personal assistant for one year in Berlin. His dissertation was based on work done at both laboratories.
